

Cookie Policy

What is a cookie?

A cookie is a file stored on your device (computer, tablet, etc.) by Cancer@Work when you use the website, depending on your browser. During its storage period, this file allows your device to be identified during future visits to the website, enabling us to retain your browsing and visit data.

Cancer@Work may use various personal data collection systems, including cookies on our website, for which your consent is requested. The following types of cookies may be used:

- **Necessary cookies** — required for the optimal functioning of the website (for example: login, shopping cart)
- **Performance cookies** — used to produce anonymous statistics and measure website traffic, as well as tracking and personalisation cookies that collect information about your use of the website and allow us to tailor our offers
- **Third-party cookies** — used to target advertisements that may be of interest to you based on your detected interests (these cookies are managed by third parties and not by Cancer@Work)
- **Analytics cookies** — used to understand and analyse your browsing behaviour on our website

Cancer@Work may also use third-party cookies that enable content sharing on social networks or interaction tools (e.g. “Like” buttons). In such cases, you may be identified by the social network, which may track your browsing activity. You should refer to the relevant social network’s privacy and cookie policies, as Cancer@Work is not responsible for these external tools.

Cookies are subject to your acceptance on our website during your first visit. The validity period of cookie consent is a maximum of 13 months from the time consent is first given.

You can manage your cookie preferences directly through your browser settings. You may choose to accept all cookies, be notified when a cookie is set, or refuse all cookies. If you refuse some or all cookies, certain website features may be affected or some pages may become inaccessible.

How to disable cookies

If you are using **Internet Explorer 8 and later**:

1. Go to “Tools” in the menu bar and click on “Internet Options”
2. Click on the “Privacy” tab at the top
3. Move the slider up to the “Block all cookies” setting to block all cookies, or down to “Accept all cookies” to allow them

If you are using **Firefox 30.0 and later**:

1. Click the “menu” button and select “Options”
2. Select the “Privacy” panel
3. In the History section, under “Retention rules”, select “Use custom settings for history”
4. Check “Accept cookies” to enable cookies, or uncheck it to disable them. If you experience issues, make sure “Accept third-party cookies” is not set to “Never”
5. Choose how long cookies should be stored:
 - “Keep until: they expire” → cookies are deleted at their expiration date
 - “Keep until: I close Firefox” → cookies are deleted when you close Firefox
 - “Keep until: ask me every time” → a warning appears each time a website wants to store a cookie
6. Click OK to close the “Options” window

If you are using **Google Chrome**:

1. Go to the “Tools” menu
2. Click “Settings”
3. Click “Advanced settings”
4. Click “Privacy / Content settings”
5. Select “Cookies”, then choose “Block third-party cookies and site data”

If you are using **Safari 5.0 and later**:

1. Go to Safari > Preferences and click “Security”
2. In the “Accept cookies” section, choose when Safari should accept cookies from websites. Click the help button (question mark icon) for explanations of the options. If Safari is set to block cookies, you may need to temporarily enable them to open a page. Repeat the steps above and select “Always”. Once finished, disable cookies again and delete site cookies.
